Estonian energy storage power station lithium battery



Overview

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Estonia has laid the cornerstone for what will become the largest battery park in continental Europe, a major step toward synchronising the Baltic power grids with Europe by 2025; the project, led by Evecon, Corsica Sole and Mirova, aims to bolster energy security and support Estonia's transition.

As Europe races toward 2030 renewable targets, the Tallinn Power Storage Project has become a litmus test for grid-scale battery viability in northern climates. Operational since Q4 2024, this 240 MWh lithium-ion system supports Estonia's ambitious plan to derive 50% of its electricity from wind.

NIB has signed a EUR 27.7 million 10-year loan agreement with Baltic Storage Platform OÜ to finance the construction of two battery energy storage projects, Hertz 1 and Hertz 2, in Estonia. Why is energy storage important for Estonia?

Energy storage is also vital for meeting Estonia's goal of sourcing all its electricity from renewable sources by 2030. The country's climate minister, Yoko Alender, emphasised the role of storage systems in this transition, saying they would help ensure a "clean, reliable and affordable energy future"

for Estonia.

Should Estonia invest in battery parks?

Estonia's investment in large-scale battery parks highlights its strategic push for both energy independence and a more sustainable power grid. However, battery parks do have environmental impacts.

Who owns the Battery Park in Estonia?

The battery park will be called the Baltic Storage Platform, in which Evecon will have a 20 percent stake and Corsica Sole will have 80 percent stake. Climate Minister Kristen Michal (Reform) said that the emergence of reserve and storage capacities in Estonia is good news and it is particularly welcome that it is being done by private companies.

Can Eesti Energia build a large-scale energy storage facility?

Eesti Energia was unable to secure a contract for a large-scale energy storage facility through an international tender. It is expected that it would have a capacity ranging from 25 to 50 megawatt-hours that sufficiently meets the reserve needs of the Baltic countries.

Does Eesti Energi have a Bess battery?

Estonia utility Eesti Energi has completed the procurement for its 26.5MW/51MWh BESS with LG Energy Solution to provide the batteries.

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
