

Why was the JBC decommissioned?

Following the controversial de-commissioning of the JBC for financial and political reasons. Its television service was taken over by its old rival, the Radio Jamaica and two of its three radio stations were integrated into RJR's stable of radio outlets to create the new Jamaica Broadcasting Corporation (JBC).

Despite the FM being available from the 1940s, its diffusion into Jamaica as a commercially viable means for radio broadcasting coincided w.
